


MSCHOLASTIC


It is important to note Scholastic is no longer accepting payment by cheque; a credit card will now be required to pay for any Scholastic orders.



What is ECS - Kindergarten?

Kindergarten is a part of the Alberta Education learning continuum and is offered the year before grade 1. It is a play based learning opportunity for your child to establish the foundations that increase successes in their future learning. It is an important milestone in your child's life and marks their formal entry into school. Our programs are offered in an inclusive school environment with opportunities to participate in classes such as Physical Education, Music, STEM, and Art.

What does our ECS -Kindergarten Program look like?

Thanks to the team based approach of families, staff, and specialists, an enriching educational experience for each child in their local community school is possible. Our child centered programs and supports use the Alberta Education Kindergarten curriculum and infuse it within play-based learning and structured activities. Our learning experiences focus on areas that include:

Language and Communication: Opportunities that include lots of storytelling, reading, listening, and vocabulary building activities to enhance language and communication skills.

Cognitive Skills: Introduction to letters, numbers, shapes, and basic literacy and mathematical concepts through fun and interactive activities.

Physical Development: Activities and experiences that help children grow in their fine and gross motor skills to help them prepare for kindergarten and daily living.

Social Skills and Approaches to Learning: Group play, sharing, and cooperation activities to develop social skills and emotional intelligence.

Awareness of Self and Environment: Experiences to grow a child's understanding of the world and their ability to make connections between classroom, home, and the community.



Is My Child Eligible?

To be eligible to attend in the 2024/25 school year, children must be 5 years old on or before December 31, 2024.





Family Resilience Program

This program is a <u>voluntary program</u> within the M.D. of Wainwright & M.D. of Provost that supports families with children 0-18 years of age. We offer in-home family support; however, it can also be in your community, at a coffee shop or the library, and over the phone or even virtual at the family's request. This voluntary program focuses on various areas but is not limited to: improving parental capacity, communication skills, sibling rivalry, conflict resolution, the understanding of different parental styles, child behavioral issues, positive strategies with difficult behaviors, co-parenting for separating or already separated families, blended family cohesion, parent-teen mediation, mental health concerns, positive strategies with difficult behaviors, enhancing family connection, school concerns, advocacy/working collaboratively with other services providers (this may include accompany participants to appointments with other service providers, emotional and personal support for parents, referrals to other resources and/or supports or collaborative transition planning from one program to another as well as aftercare supports to ensure that families are continuing down their path of success.

This <u>program is free</u> to all clients, and referrals can be from various organizations or self-referrals. At WJS we can also meet with youth separately, however our style of working with youth may be different than other organizations that are working with youth. We do not look at ourselves as youth workers but as Family Support Coaches helping youth accomplish their goals and ultimately be part of their family. Therefore, should we get a referral that list the youth from ages 12-18 as the individual needing support, we will conduct an assessment to ensure that a holistic approach is used to work with the youth, but with family participation to support the goals. As a whole, we very much believe the involvement of family can often be the key for the youths' success. Our goal is to ensure that youth are an active part of their family, so that they will have an opportunity to grow long and sustainable relationships with their families as they mature into adulthood. The parent will join the program in at and/or around the 3-month mark to work on goals for themselves, with meetings alternating youth, caregiver and youth, caregiver, until the youth has accomplished their goal(s) and/or the parent has the ability and desire to continue to take over the support of their youths' goal(s).

Our Offices are open 8:30 – 4:30 Monday through to Friday. Our workers will work with you at times that are convenient to you and your family which could include some evenings and weekends.

Report cards and Parent Portal Information 2023-24

This year we will be continuing with online grade reporting. If you have not already please make sure you register to access your child's report cards by calling Ashley at the office!

Frequently Asked Questions:

- I. Will there still be printed copies of report cards for each reporting period? No, there will not be printed copies of report cards sent home for each reporting period for Grades 1-3.
- 2. When are the reporting periods for Kindergarten? There are 3 reporting periods; December, March and June.
- 3. Will there still be Student-led Conferences (Parent-Teacher Interviews)? Yes, Amisk School and BTPS believe that parent-teacher communication is vital in our quest to maximize student learning. There will be interviews scheduled in the fall and spring.
- 4. How do I get the information I need to set up a BTPS Parent Portal account? Contact your child's school to verify your e-mail address in our software program and let them know the child/children you are needing to set up an account for. The school will then request the Student Information Services Department to email the information to you.
- 5. Do I need a different account for each child? No, you will be able to create one account, choosing your own username and password. Once you are logged in, you will be able to access all the children that you linked to the account.
- 6. Can parents each have their own account? Yes, as long as the accounts are not created with the same email address.
- 7. Can students access the portal? Yes, they log in to the same portal, but they use their BTPS network login. They do not need to request information to create an account and they only see their data, not data of siblings.
- 8. Is the BTPS Parent Portal only available as web pages? No, there is also a mobile app called PowerSchool Mobile which is available for download in the App Store or on Google Play. Our district code for the app is GFST.
- 9. What information can I see in the BTPS Parent Portal? You will be able to see attendance, marks, comments, teacher email addresses, BTPS Transportation fees and BTPS tuition fees (not individual school fees), student demographic information, public messages on the School Bulletin and general school information.
- 10. Why is BTPS moving to electronic reporting of marks? There are a number of reasons:
 - * 24/7 access to mark and comment information will promote student-parent-teacher teamwork based on current assessment data.
 - * Mark and comment data will be accurate, timely and informative.
 - * Teachers will be commenting on individual assignments to give guidance for upcoming assignments: effective and timely feedback is a critical component of success.
 - * Alberta Education and post-secondary institutions are moving to electronic reporting and we want to help prepare parents and students.
