




WE CAN MAKE A DIFFERENCE

Learning about emotions from a young age is essential: it helps children build self-awareness, empathy, communication skills, and resilience — tools that last a lifetime. When a child can recognize emotionslike joy, anger, love, or sadness, they're more able toexpress themselves in healthy ways and understand others. The **Little Spot of Emotions series is** especially helpful here: by giving each feeling a character and "voice," childrencan relate to these emotions concretely, learn normalizing language for what they feel, and begin to engage in emotional regulation earlier and more confidently.

In rural Alberta, universal mental health services in the classroom are particularly important.

Eventhough there are many protective factorsforstudents in arural environment(close to familyand community members most likely know your name), students often face unique barriers: fewer specialists nearby, longer travel distances services, less anonymity in small communities, and sometimes fewer peer supports. Having universal mental health supports built into every classroom ensures that all children—regardless of need, background, or geography—get access to tools to understand and manage their emotions, rather than waiting until things escalate. Programs like Wow provide universal prevention and promotion of emotional health across rural communities.

By combining early emotional education (like Little Spot of Emotions) with classroom-wide mental health services, rural schools can create safe, inclusive environments where every student feels supported, learns emotional literacy, and has better chances for academic success and well-being.






Grade 1



WOW!!! Where did September go? We have been very busy in grade one this year refreshing our memories of numbers to ten and our letter sounds. With our letter sounds we have been using them to sound out and spell words that contain short a,i, and o sounds. Every day we write something about our day in our agenda. We have made so much progress in our letter formations and neat printing. In the gym, we have explored cooperative games and are now developing our soccer skills. In science we are learning about the scientific method so we have been doing some cool investigations. In social we are learning about landmarks. I'm excited to see how our learning will grow in September.



Grade 2











It has been a great first month of school! In grade 2 we have been busy learning about one another and the new rules and routines of the classroom. In Math, we've been learning all about time! We practiced connecting events to calendar dates, comparing if something is longer or shorter, and even measuring time in different ways. We also learned about winter counts, special calendars that First Nations peoples used to remember important events. Next month, we'll be diving into numbers to 100, where we will work toward a solid understanding of place value.

In Social Studies, we've been exploring maps and globes. We used words like near, far, north, south, east, and west to describe where places are. We have also been learning all the provinces and territories of Canada, including the capital cities. Soon, we'll start learning about the different physical regions of Canada.

In Science, our topic has been 'materials.' We've been learning and testing out all kinds of materials to see if they are see-through(transparency), absorb water, bend and shape easily (maleability), or reflect light (reflection). Up next, we'll learn about natural and processed materials and see how First Nations, Métis, and Inuit peoples have used natural materials to make useful objects like baskets, canoes, and tools. We are looking forward to a fantastic month of learning in October!



Grade 3



Welcome Back to school everyone! It has been a fantastic, fun filled start to the school year. This month we have been learning classroom routines and earning class cash for our first auction! In Language arts students have been working to build their Daily 5 stamina when reading, writing and spelling. We have dove into morphology and the suffixes and affixes that change the meaning and spelling of words. We have also enjoyed listening to the story "A Stranger at Home", about a young girl named Olemaun and her return to her family from residential school. In Social Studies we have been learning all about Alberta and the treaties that were created long ago. Students wrote and starred in a special land acknowledgement video that we will present at the Basket of Greatness awards this year. In Science we have been learning all about how scientists ask questions, research and conduct experiments to learn new things. Math is all about patterns and number sequences, and creating patterns that follow a rule. Soon we will begin preparing a writing piece for the time capsule that will be buried in front of our school for the next 25 years! We are looking forward to exciting events in October like bus safety, fire safety and Halloween!



What is Stigma?

One of the biggest reasons people don't get help for substance use or mental health is stigma. That means they're judged or treated unfairly because of false beliefs or stereotypes. This can further isolate someone who is struggling with substance use and/or mental health.

Words matter. Changing our words can encourage more compassion.

Stigma is not only hurtful, but it has real-life consequences.

Ways to help your family reduce stigma:

Encourage your family to talk openly about addiction and mental health Use supportive language Speak out to correct myths and stereotypes Educate yourself, your family, and others

Tackling stigma is important as it creates trust and encourages people to express their feelings and seek treatment.

Family tips for building communication and language skills

Keep messages simple Help your children get the facts **Be calm** when speaking to your kids **Be prepared** before having a difficult conversation

Don't assume you know what is going on or has happened

Check in regularly with your kids to connect better

Look for the good in each other Empathy and listening helps to see each other's perspective and to increase understanding.

Be kind - to yourself and others

Tackle stigma through the words you choose

Use positive and respectful language Avoid stereotypes and labels
Use person-first language to focus on the individual rather than the illness, disability, condition, orbehaviour




SCHOLASTIC

Welcome back to school students and families! The Scholastic Reading Club is now available for the 2025-2026 school year. At the start of this month one member from each family should have received a paper copy of our scholastic flyer. The online version of the flyer (Digi-flyer) will be included in each month's newsletter as well as sent by email for easy online ordering.

If you are new to Scholastic you will need to sign up an account online.

To set up a new account, go to scholastic.ca/rc/digiflyer. On the left side click Reading Club, then click Create an Account. Follow the links and instructions. Purchases are by credit card; no more cheques are to be made to Scholastic Canada

It is important to note Scholastic is no longer accepting payment by cheque; a credit card will now be required to pay for any Scholastic orders.



By using the code **RC272526** you can support the Amisk School and help us to buy books for our students! All orders will require the code when you get to the cart to checkout and it will remain the same for the entire year.

All purchases will be sent directly to your home or the post office.

Report cards and Parent Portal Information 2025-2026

This year we will be continuing with online grade reporting. If you have not already please make sure you register to access your child's report cards by calling Ashley at the office!

Frequently Asked Questions:

- 1. Will there still be printed copies of report cards for each reporting period?

 No, there will not be printed copies of report cards sent home for each reporting period for Grades K-3.
- 2. Will there still be Student-led Conferences (Parent-Teacher Interviews)? Yes, Amisk School and BTPS believe that parent-teacher communication is vital in our quest to maximize student learning. There will be interviews scheduled in the fall and spring.
- 3. How do I get the information I need to set up a BTPS Parent Portal account? Contact your child's school to verify your e-mail address in our software program and let them know the child/children you are needing to set up an account for. The school will then request the Student Information Services Department to email the information to you.
- 4. Do I need a different account for each child? No, you will be able to create one account, choosing your own username and password. Once you are logged in, you will be able to access all the children that you linked to the account.
- 5. Can parents each have their own account? Yes, as long as the accounts are not created with the same email address.
- 6. Can students access the portal? Yes, they log in to the same portal, but they use their BTPS network login. They do not need to request information to create an account and they only see their data, not data of siblings.
- 7. Is the BTPS Parent Portal only available as web pages? No, there is also a mobile app called PowerSchool Mobile which is available for download in the App Store or on Google Play. Our district code for the app is GFST.
- 8. What information can I see in the BTPS Parent Portal? You will be able to see attendance, marks, comments, teacher email addresses, BTPS Transportation fees and BTPS tuition fees (not individual school fees), student demographic information, public messages on the School Bulletin and general school information.
- 9. Why is BTPS moving to electronic reporting of marks? There are a number of reasons:
- * 24/7 access to mark and comment information will promote student-parentteacher teamwork based on current assessment data.
 - * Mark and comment data will be accurate, timely and informative.
- * Teachers will be commenting on individual assignments to give guidance for upcoming assignments: effective and timely feedback is a critical component of success.
- * Alberta Education and post-secondary institutions are moving to electronic reporting and we want to help prepare parents and students.
